

Unique Bonsai Subjects: Begonia dregei

For bonsai enthusiasts looking for a suitable indoor bonsai display Begonia dregei may be a perfect match. It is easy to grow, tolerates small bonsai pots and flowers during the summer, fall and in some species spring [Partita variety] months.

This species originally native to South Africa is unique among begonia in that it develops a swollen stem base [referred to as a caudex] which gives this plant a bonsai like appearance. Although it evolved in tropical and sub-tropical areas, it likes a well-drained medium, limited

watering during the winter months and tolerates an indoor environment with partial sun.

Interestingly the while male [2 pedal flowers] and female [5 pedal flowers] grow on the same pant and are interfertile. The Glasgow and Tweedle Dee varieties have silver markings on edges and in the leaves.

Although common in cultivation, and easy to propagate from seed or cuttings, B, gregei is listed by the IUCN [International Union for Conservation of Nature] as Endangered.

Bonsai Maintenance

November [SF Bay Area – Please compensate for differences in Chico weather]

November

General

- Review exposure of trees as sun moves southward; move . deciduous trees into full sun
- Satsuki azaleas: leaves produced during summer show fall color
- Rotate all trees at least once a month •

Fertilizina

- Scratch soil surface to aid penetration of nutrients
- Deciduous trees: fertilize for the last time this year w/ 0-10-10
- Satsuki azaleas: first week, give last fertilizer of year
- Last chance to apply either rape seed cake or 70% cottonseed meal: 30% bone meal
- Never feed a dormant tree unless fertilizer is low in nitrogen.

Watering

- Adjust automatic watering systems for winter
- Wisteria: remove from pan of water after foliage has yellowed

Insect, disease, & weed control (see Appendix 9)

- Use Diazinon or Malathion for aphids, Sevin for ants, Ortho's Funginex for powdery mildew
- Apply lime-sulfur spray first in late November (second in December, third in January);
 - Usually light mists applied at 4-5 week intervals into late January-early February provide adequate protection plus effective control of scale and spider-mites
 - If you have pruned, wait 3 or 4 days before spraying
 - Cover roots and pot to protect from damage
 - CAREFULLY READ AND FOLLOW MANUFACTURER'S DIRECTIONS
 - Be careful not to spray new sprouts and buds
 - Do not use lime-sulfur on
 - azaleas, camellias, ezo spruce, ume, or any plants showing growth of buds
 - trees to be displayed in an exhibit within the next few weeks
 - Shake plants vigorously after spraying to remove excess spray and avoid burning of foliage

Styling/Pruning

Study trunk taper and placement of equally balanced branches; remove excessive branching

- Study radial effect of rootage; look for a defined apex or a soft rounded top; reestablish tree's basic design
- Deciduous trees: improve overall design; eliminate crisscross branching, excessively heavy top branches, unsightly vertical twigs, and unnecessary crotch branches; reduce long internodes; remove wiring that has served its purpose
- Maples: prune and lightly wire after leaves wither and before cold . weather to minimize bleeding
- Satsuki azaleas: Mark for later removal or reduction any branches showing undesired dark pigments; remove any wire cutting into bark and all wire if branches have settled into desired positions; late in month begin to reduce summer's growth, thin buds , and wire and bend trunks and branches; let plants dry out to facilitate bending
- Ume: Ensure blossoms for next year by moving plant to a warm location, after the first frost, and misting daily; anticipate flower buds within two weeks.
- Black or hard pines: remove needles from previous year(s) and cut-back to create desired shape of crown; wire and bend branches
- Group plantings: reexamine shape, height, flow; direction; wire if needed; remove wire before it bites into bark

Repotting

- Best done when plants begin their dormant period and continuing warm sun encourages root development; many temperate zone plants begin root growth this month
- After leaf drop and for all fall/winter clean-up, carefully remove top 1/2 inch of soil from trunk/root area out to pot lip to remove insect eggs and weed seeds; replace with new soil to enhance development of surface roots
- Review and, if needed, replenish supplies of potting mix; screen materials and aggregates (i.e.: pumice, sand, lava rock, decomposed granite, etc.) as
- well as humus (i.e.: fir and cedar bark, redwood).

Propagating/Collecting

- Accent plants: divide clumps of bamboos, grasses, sedges, herbaceous perennials, bulbs, etc.
- Evergreens: continue rooting cuttings
- Graft only hornbeam, beech, pine (see Appendix 8)
